

2023 Annual Report

In 2023, Bethesda Metro Area Village debuted a new logo which better showcases the values – friendship, fun, caring, and connection – which unite the BMAV community. BMAV brings together both those who have lived in Bethesda for years and those who have moved here more recently, through opportunities to develop friendships and engage in cultural, educational, and physical activities. This past year we counted over 400 events, sponsored by the village and its special interest groups, that gave our members the opportunity to socialize, learn, and stretch both mentally and physically.

In our seventh year of operations, our Board of Directors continued healthy transitions in leadership and membership and completed a strategic planning process to help us anticipate and meet the challenges and opportunities that face us over the next five years. We continue to be on solid financial footing, working toward our village's mission:

To build an engaged, caring community of members who want to remain in their homes as they age.

To provide members with opportunities to make and strengthen social connections, explore educational and cultural activities, and engage in shared interests with friends.

To provide volunteers who perform services that help members remain in their homes with dignity.

BMAV is part of the national aging-in-place movement dedicated to providing services, community support, and social opportunities that allow people to remain in their own homes, safely and independently in the community they know and love. We are active in the national Village to Village network and in the Washington Area Village Exchange (WAVE) – including serving as a mentor to developing villages, and our Executive Director serving on WAVE's Board and Programs Committee.



- Our membership continued to grow, gaining 30 new members and ending the year with 140 members 38 Full Service and 102 Social.
- We welcome Social members from anywhere in Bethesda not served by another village and offer subsidized memberships to those seniors who express a need.
- Social members enjoy our robust programming, making connections in the neighborhood and helping their neighbors. Full Service members can, in addition, receive volunteer-provided services.



 Our service boundaries for Full Service members run from Old Georgetown Road and Wisconsin Avenue to our east, Glenbrook Road/Little Falls Parkway to Hillandale Road to Chevy Chase Drive to Goldsboro Road on the south, River Road on our west, and Wilson Lane to Huntington Parkway on our north. We serve the neighborhoods of Battery Park, South Bradley Hills, Whitehall Manor, Edgemoor, English Village, Greenwich Forest, Kenwood Park, Landon Village, and Kenwood Forest.

Our Services

• Forty-nine volunteers provided these services for our village members:

Rides, deliveries, light home repair, technology assistance, absentowner services, medical notetaking, friendly visits or calls, and nonmedical respite care for primary caregivers.

- Through WAVE, our Executive Director attended seminars on best practices for volunteer outreach, training, and retention. We held four virtual volunteer training sessions in 2023, and several individual interviews and training sessions were held with high school students.
- Students earning Student Service Learning (SSL) credit perform inperson technology tutoring for BMAV members in sessions at the Connie Morella Library. We are very grateful to these students for their thoughtful service. We also want to thank the library for making space available, and to the Montgomery County Volunteer Center for connecting us.



 During 2023, BMAV's knitting and needlework Shared Interest Group members donated 180 items, representing hundreds of hours of crafting, to Bethesda Cares, National Center for Children and Families, the Greater Washington DC Diaper Bank, Walter Reed oncology, and Christ Child Society. The group has made such donations for the past five years.





 Members and volunteers from the village participated in a pen pal exchange with a fourth grade class at Bethesda Elementary. Many of the students speak a language other than English at home or are recent newcomers to the country – these connections have been enjoyed by both generations and continued in 2024. In April, we were able to hold our annual Volunteer Appreciation event in person, with a catered luncheon for 40 volunteers.





Our Activities

This year BMAV continued to create engaging online events for our members to be able to connect and socialize from home, while also providing indoor events and outdoor gatherings, such as: walks, hikes, coffee talk and happy hour, restaurant dineouts, socials, museum visits and tours.

In 2023 we created or partnered in 445 events – with more than 3100 participants. Many of our programs are open to the community, helping everyone to connect and prevent isolation, as well as spread the word about the village.



- In collaboration with Silver Spring Village, BMAV arranged a meeting with the Montgomery County Council in June to showcase all county villages. Formal presentations were made, and time was allotted for villages to connect with Councilmembers and their staff. Andrew Friedson, the Councilmember representing areas served by BMAV and now the Council President, highlighted villages in his constituent newsletter.
- Executive Director Elizabeth Haile and other WAVE Board members led a successful conference in October for all DC-area villages to learn from each other in person. BMAV Board members and committee chairs attended and enjoyed speakers, learning sessions, and lunch.
- BMAV continued collaborating with the Bethesda Connie Morella Library to sponsor free programming for seniors that benefits not only our members but seniors throughout the area. Programs were held on Zoom and in the library meeting room.



- We also worked with the Bethesda Historical Society, Montgomery History, Montgomery County Volunteer Center, Suburban Hospital, area museums, other senior villages in the DC area, and professionals in the community who shared their expertise on various educational topics.
- In April we held a three-part workshop series with Dr. Eleanor Tanno on creating advanced directives. Individuals were guided through planning steps and trained to help others. This was made possible by the award of an Advances in Aging grant from Suburban Hospital.



 Our Shared Interest Groups – member-initiated and member-led – continue to be the backbone of our village programming. Each small group get-together allows village members to get to know each other at regular gatherings, some online and some in person. With the addition of a new group focused on wine, we now have 17 shared interest and social groups that provide programming throughout the year: Aging Well, Armchair Travel, Biking, Birding, Bridge, Book Club, Dining Out, Film Fans, Hiking, Walking, Knitting and Needlework, Gardening, Coffee Talk, Happy Hour, Wine Tasting, Men's and Ladies' Lunch.



• BMAV provided opportunities for self-improvement:

Monthly technology "chats" with volunteers addressing common tech problems. Online and in-person fitness classes. Discussion of curated TED talks. Chess classes led by area high school students. Workshops on: decluttering, nutrition for seniors, fall prevention, scam prevention, Alzheimer's research, end-of-life planning, hospice care, green burials, ethical wills, getting the most out of a doctor's visit, writing a memoir, navigating Medicare Part D, fire safety, and designing your life for success.

• Opportunities to experience history, culture and literature:

Free tickets to Round House Theatre as part of its community program. Biking and kayaking on the Potomac. Outdoor concerts. Inperson private tours, and online tours, of Smithsonian American Art Museum. In-person tours of DC's new Rubell Museum, Capital Jewish Museum, Museum of Illusions, National Gallery of Art, Chesapeake & Ohio Canal National Historical Park, Glenstone, Hillwood, neighborhood gardens, and historic Bethesda with Hank Levine and Bethesda Historical Society. US national security expert Michael O'Hanlon, on current international events. White House photographer Christy Bowe. Historian Elisabeth Griffith on Elizabeth Cady Stanton. Kate Andersen Brower on Elizabeth Taylor. Ambassador Swanee Hunt. Hank Levine on the roots of modern Bethesda. Former NPR national security correspondent David Welna.

 And opportunities to socialize – in game nights, in socials at each other's homes, and at "paint and sip" evenings.


<u>Donations</u>
