Both our membership and our boundaries are growing. We're proud to say that we just welcomed our 99th member. Join Bethesda Metro Area Village and be our 100th!

In addition, BMAV now includes several new neighborhoods: Kenwood Park and Landon Village/Pineview (just west of Bradley Boulevard), the neighborhoods of Pyle/Maiden Lane to the north, and Bradley Boulevard to the east.

The board of directors' approval of the expansion was based on unanimous feedback from members who responded to the board's request for input on expanding our coverage. Here are BMAV's new boundaries:

- Old Georgetown Road and Wisconsin Avenue to the east
- Glenbrook Road/Little Falls Parkway, Hillandale Road, Chevy Chase Drive and Goldsboro Road to the south
- River Road to the west
- Wilson Lane and Huntington Parkway to the north



Interview with members Susan and Barry Gorman

Susan and Barry Gorman are relatively new members of BMAV, although they've lived in and near Bethesda for quite a while. Each of their three moves brought them progressively closer to downtown Bethesda, where they and Monty, their 14-year-old pup, are happy as clams. The three of them are city folk who revel in being steps away from a French bakery, a butcher shop, restaurants and more, and in meeting other dogs and humans along the way. Monty much prefers daily walks in the relative hustle-bustle of Bethesda to their quiet, leafy neighborhood.

Susan is a native Washingtonian. Barry was born in Brooklyn, spent the first few years of his life in Flushing, and then moved with his family to Stamford, CT. He and Susan met at GWU when she was an undergraduate working in the hospital gift shop and he was a medical



Susan finished her degree at GW and went on to get an MA at Catholic University of America. She became a psychoanalyst and, later, a psychotherapist. She taught at several institutes, including one at CUA, had a practice and started a low-fee referral service in Washington, using trainees to help patients. The referral service is still in operation.

Barry is a psychiatrist. He began his medical career in solo practice, but after 10 years wanted to be part of a larger practice. He became a partner in the Metropolitan Psychiatric Group and started McLean Family Counseling Center, a multidisciplinary group with 14 clinicians. Twenty-five years later he returned to private practice. For 10 years during this time, he worked voluntarily four hours a week for the Arlington County Medical Society's Open Line, answering questions from callers related to mental health.

Barry and Susan are in the same practice together, sometimes collaborating on patients. They each have the same mentor, a senior psychoanalyst in his 90s who helps them continue to learn and grow. He's head of the institute at CUA that Susan graduated from.

They have scaled back their work lives to have more free time to do things together and separately. They love going to plays and the movies, travelling to the Caribbean and Florida in winter and visiting new places in the U.S. and Canada. They also like walking along the water in Georgetown, usually stopping for a tasty treat. They're currently into scones and highly recommend Dog Tag Bakery on Grace Street, not only because the scones are delicious, but also because the employees are veterans, military spouses and caregivers.

Their days are full. In addition to working half-time, Susan walks 1½ hours and swims daily, does stretching and yoga and reads. Susan has been in two book clubs for several years. Barry works three days a week, has been in a book club for over 20 years, and plays tennis and golf frequently. They both meditate every day and focus on finding balance in their lives among love, work, people and play.

Susan and Barry have two adult children. Their son is a developer in DC with two young daughters. Their daughter, also with two young children, lives in Manhattan. She's following in her parents' footsteps: she's a clinical psychologist. Her parents go to New York at least once a month to visit.

Barry and Susan first heard about age-in-place villages from a friend who belonged to one in DC. They liked the concept a lot but didn't know there was one right where they live. They learned about BMAV in a chance encounter with a member early this year and joined the very next day. They particularly like the village idea of community, especially after one's kids are grown and gone. They also enjoy special BMAV's events and activities, such as the curator-led tour of the Phillips Gallery earlier this year, an experience they would not have had if they hadn't joined.

A GSA guide explained that the posters were commissioned by the then-U.S. Post Office Department as a way of telling the history of the post office. They were done in various styles by different artists. Some are now considered controversial because of their representation of women and Native Americans.

Property tax credit expanded for surviving spouses of retired military

Recent county legislation expands the property tax credit_for surviving spouses of retired military services members. Under Bill 21-19, a surviving spouse is eligible for the credit under the following circumstances:

- the individual is a surviving spouse of a retired member of the uniformed services, the military reserves, or the national guard; and
- the surviving spouse is at least 65 years old; and
- the surviving spouse has not remarried.

The deadline to apply for the property tax credit is October 1, 2019. Eligible individuals can apply at the Department of Finance's website. To access the application, click here.
